In 1842, fellow Frenchmen François and Louis Blanc added the "0" to the roulette wheel. In the early 1800s, roulette was brought into the U.S. where, and a second zero, "00", was introduced. (In some forms of early American Roulette the double-zero was replaced by an American Eagle.) In the 1800s, roulette spread all over both Europe and the U.S., becoming one of the most famous and most popular casino games. Some call roulette the "King of Casino Games", probably because it was associated with the glamour of the casinos in Monte Carlo.

How to Play

The Roulette Wheel has 36 numbers plus a "0" and "00." The numbers are alternately colored red and black, except for the zeros, which are green. Players place their bets on the layout on the numbers corresponding with the ones on the Roulette Wheel. The Dealer then spins the wheel and the ball in opposite directions from each other. When the ball drops into the winning number and comes to rest, the Dealer then clears all the losing bets and pays all winning bets. Each Player receives different colored chips to avoid confusion. These chips have no value on any other game and must be cashed in before leaving the table. Players can make a variety of wagers at the same time for a chance to get multiple payoffs. A wager on a single number is called "straight up." A wager on two numbers is called a "split." It's a "street bet" for three numbers and a "corner" for four numbers.
